July 4, Baseball game and colorguard, details later



Calvin Coolidge

The next in our series of Presidents of the United States, who were members of the Sons of the American Revolution, John Calvin Coolidge, Jr.. Coolidge was born on July 4, 1872 in Plymouth Notch, Vermont the only President born on Independence Day to John Calvin Coolidge, Sr. and Victoria Josephine Moor. He was the eldest two children born to this family, his sister, Abigail died when Coolidge was eighteen six years after their Mother had died. The Coolidge Family had a long genealogy in New England, the first John Coolidge came to the US from Cottenham, England in 1630 and Coolidge's great great grandfather, John Coolidge was a officer during the Revolution. Coolidge attended Black River Academy and was a graduate of Amherst College, he moved to



Massachusetts shortly after graduation and apprenticed himself to a law firm, Hammond and Field, where he read the law, and Coolidge was admitted to the Bar in 1897. In 1905 Coolidge met a young women from Vermont, Grace Anna Goodhue, they were married in the parlor of her parent's home on October 4,1905. They were by most accounts a happy couple, opposites in personality, she talkative and out going and he quiet and reticent. They had two children, John born in 1906 and Calvin Jr. born in 1908. Coolidge then began the process of most lawyers of that age, he opened his own law firm and began to get involved in local politics, joining the Republican City Committee, he was elected City Solicitor 1900 and again in 1901, then in 1903 he was selected to be Clerk of the Courts. In 1904 Coolidge was defeated for the only time in his life, running for the Northampton School Board he was defeated because he had no children, his comment, "Might give me time!". In 1906 Coolidge was nominated for the Massachusetts House of Representatives, he was elected for a second term in 1907 and then in 1910 ran for Mayor of Northampton, he served as Mayor until 1912 when he ran for State Senator. He would serve in this capacity 1914 when he was elected as President of the Massachusetts State Senate. In 1915 he ran for Massachusetts Lt. Governor and was elected to 3 terms continuing until 1918 when he was elected Governor of Massachusetts. In 1919 the Boston Police went on strike the Mayor of Boston fired the Police Commissioner, Edwin Curtis and called out local National Guard units. Coolidge stepped in and reinstated Curtis and called up more units of the Guard and then took personal control of the Boston Police Department, then entire affair resulted in the country realized Coolidge could handle a crisis. This in turn led to him being suggested as a Presidential Candidate in the 1920 election. After 10 ballots Warren G. Harding was nominated for President and after a couple of ballots for Vice President, Coolidge was brought forward as a compromise candidate for Vice President. They were elected and Coolidge settled into the VP role and soon was being called "Silent Cal" because no one ever heard anything from him. The on August 2, 1923, Harding died of a heart attack in San Francisco and Coolidge ascended to the Presidency, he would serve out Harding's term and then be elected in 1924 to a term of his own. After the Convention of 1924 personal tragedy struck, his youngest son, Calvin, Jr. developed a blister on his foot playing tennis, it became infected and he died shortly after of sepsis (blood poisoning). Coolidge was never the same, he became more quiet and withdrawn. Coolidge finished his term as President and declined reelection in 1928. He retire to his home "the Beeches" he would serve as the Chair of the Railroad Commission, Honorary President of the Foundation for the Blind, a director of the New York Life Insurance Company, Trustee of Amherst College. On January 5, 1933 he died on a heart attack and laid to rest in Plymouth Notch,
